But before I start my book, I'd like to share with you about some of my favorite things.




Okay, now I'm ready to write about what wetlands are, their importance, and facts about one of my favorite animals, the Western Scrub Jay

First, wetlands are essentially a very unique ecosystem in that the land is always, or at least most of time, wet-hence the name, wetlands. This ecosystem has special characteristics such as:

Second, 90% of the wetlands have been destroyed due to development and unsustainable farming practices. That means, only 10% remain today. We must conserve and protect this ecosystem.




